My first memory of you is, technically, not really of *you*. This was one of the many ways you led by example – if you could be involved in the details across all parts of the company, there was no excuse

for less than perfect recall of details related to each of our particular responsibilities. You demanded a lot, but were generous with praise and shows of appreciation that made the effort worth every minute.

It is surreal to be sitting here and writing down memories of you. You were so dynamic, so vibrant, so energetic, so *alive*, that the contradiction between past and present is unfathomable. And yet. In retrospect, you always seemed (at least to someone outside your immediate circle) to be a combination of conflicts. Big-picture-oriented while always in control of all the details. "Larger than life" while remaining approachable and personable to even the most junior employees. A businessman par-excellence while (at least based on the library you kept outside your conference room) showing great interest in history and philosophy. A tough, motorcycle-riding, manly man, who also drew balloons and flowers on personalized letters to employees.

You reminded us of the importance of the work we do, and the great environmental imperative behind you founding SolarEdge. It was impossible to hear you speak about the company's mission and not leave the speech incredibly motivated to go out and do the very best we can to succeed. You made us and our families proud of our company and proud of the effort we put into our work. A couple of years ago, my daughter's first-grade class got a homework assignment to fill in the blanks in the following statement: My father's/mother's job is ______ and it is important because

My daughter answered that her father's job is to be an electrical engineer at SolarEdge, and it is important because SolarEdge is trying to save the world.

You will live in our hearts as an inspiring and visionary leader. It was a tremendous privilege and honor to call you our leader. And as you always signed your messages – we will continue onwards.
